



2020-2021 Annual Report

Message from the President:

Most public health professionals will agree that this past year has been extremely challenging but enlightening. In an unprecedented effort, public health has had to globally work together in real-time to collect and analyze data while integrating evidence from across disciplines for quick decision making. Data-based decisions needed to be made amidst an ever-changing landscape. Media played a large role in getting information out to the public but politics sometimes drove what information people wanted to believe. Expedient yet transparent review processes became crucial to decision-making in public health and in medicine.

While we do not know what our new “normal” will look like, we know that public health decision-making will still need to be based on carefully collected, well-analyzed data. Data is the cornerstone of public health and will remain so in the future to build effective public health responses. We need to continue to dream big and work for a better tomorrow.

Despite the challenges, MPHA has accomplished a great deal this past year! Some of the highlights have been:

- Learning how to navigate from in-person events to an all-virtual platform. We are hoping to use a hybrid model in the future to keep some of the benefits we have found from using virtual platforms to bring members events and programming!
- Holding two virtual conferences- The first in fall of 2020, *The Power of Many: Building a Healthier Future Together for All* and the second this spring improving upon what was learned in the previous fall, *Bold and Humble - Engaging in Anti-Racist Public Health*.
- Passing two new policy resolutions, *Racism as a Public Health Crisis* and *Universal School Meals*; and extensively updating our *Impact of Climate Change on Health* policy resolution.
- Work with pro-bono lawyers on helping to defend Minnesota’s mask mandate during the COVID-19 pandemic. At the time of this report, the Court of Appeals granted our request to file an amicus brief. A draft brief is being finalized.
- Collaborated with Minnesota Department of Health on furthering health equity and anti-racist public health educational opportunities.
- Sent and had members complete a policy issue survey to get an idea of membership’s priorities. Members ranked the following issues as their priority issues (ranked from most votes to fewer votes): Health equity and racism, public health funding, health care access and affordability, and gun violence prevention.
- Completed the series of policy forums on the topic of *Environmental Health: Is There Justice for All?* While the first of this series was held in person, the last three were moved to a virtual platform.

In addition to the statements issued around racism and inequities, we offered members virtual coffee chats, special speaker events given by Dr. Michael Osterholm, former Commissioner of Health Dr. Ed Ehlinger, and economists from the Federal Reserve Bank in Minneapolis.

Finally, because of the great work Minnesota Public Health Association has been doing, and the important work of the health equity committee, MPHA received a \$100K grant from the Blue Cross-Blue Shield Foundation to make further inroads on promoting and actualizing health equity in Minnesota.

It has been an honor to serve as your President this past year. One final note of “thanks” to all the organizations-- members and donors-- who have supported MPHA over this past year, and all the individuals who worked to accomplish so much during the pandemic!

Committee Updates

Communications

MPHA's Communications Committee, chaired by Kristin Moore and Kalli Plump, worked very hard to establish, grow, and maintain relationships to expand MPHA's spotlights. At the beginning of 2021, MPHA sent a letter to President Biden, Governor Walz, and the Minnesota Congressional Delegation to rescind Executive Order (EO) 13950, *Combating Race and Sex Stereotyping*. MPHA also distributed an op-ed (published in MinnPost on April 7, 2021) for National Public Health Week around rebuilding and refocusing our public health efforts.

The Communications Committee worked closely with MPHA's Governing Council to respond to events that were happening in Minnesota and across the country in order to make MPHA's voice heard in the public sphere. For instance, MPHA released a statement denouncing the insurrection on January 6th at the U.S. Capitol; statements on the death of Daunte Wright and the verdict of the Derek Chauvin trial; and a statement speaking out against Anti-Asian Racism.

Another focus of 2020-2021 was increasing the activity and engagement of MPHA's social media accounts through the utilization of Stories and increasing our number of posts. This included a 7-Day Wellness Challenge that encouraged people to engage with MPHA's social media accounts and promote self-care during National Public Health Week.




Membership








These events, and other MPHA member engagement information, were featured on a [poster](#) that was presented at the MPHA 2021 Annual Conference.



Other efforts of the Membership Committee include decreasing barriers to membership, which was guided by the 2020 Membership Survey results. They offered their first-ever membership sale last June, which provided 50% off membership to people

affected by COVID. Additionally, they created a new, reduced-price membership level for individuals who are unemployed, affected by COVID-19, are an early career professional, etc.



New for the committee is the collaboration and merge with the Communications Committee. At this time, they are in a trial phase to see if this merge is the best decision for MPHA. This committee, titled the Membership and Communications Committee, is co-chaired by Delaine Anderson and Michelle Clegg. This committee is aptly titled the Membership & Communications Committee. Annual Conference




The Minnesota Public Health Association (MPHA)'s 2021 Annual Conference "*Bold and Humble - Engaging in Anti Racist Public Health*" was held virtually over two half-days on Thursday, April 29 1-4:30pm and Friday April 30, 9 am – 12 pm.

211 people registered for the conference. The American Public Health Association's president, José Ramón Fernández-Peña, MD, MPA, delivered a keynote address. Additional plenary speakers included Dr. Eddie Moore Jr., Kenston Henderson, Sr., and Rosemond Sarpong Owens, CDM, MPH. They thoughtfully guided attendees through anti-racism practices from their national-level experiences. Fourteen inspiring breakout sessions were presented, and a regional session from the Great Lakes Public Health Coalition. For 2021, MPHA was pleased to be able to offer breakout presenters a small stipend. This compensation was a step toward equality and justice by recognizing intellectual property costs, especially of Black, American Indian, and presenters of color, and those who may face financial barriers in contributing their time at our conference. For the second year in a row, a call for proposals was released in an effort to widen our breath of presenters and topics; 32 proposals were received, not including plenary presentations.

In an effort to bring engaging virtual professional development to our audience, the 2021 program included several new pieces:

- An interactive [Poster Session](#) featured posters and brief talks from 12 presenters on a variety of topics. The poster session opened in conjunction with a virtual [Exhibit Hall](#), allowing further engagement with conference attendees and our supporting partners.
- A yoga instructor facilitated active breaks each day in a meaningful way connected to the conference theme.
- At the end of Day 1, many attendees stayed online for virtual bingo and networking!
- American Sign Language Interpreters were present at the entire conference.
- Focused outreach to schools offering public-health related programs greatly increased student participation.
- Recognizing the importance of art and messaging, Uzoma Obasi's images were shown with permission (see below).



Attendees finished the conference ready to start Dr. Moore's 21 Day Racial Equity Challenge (<https://21daychallenge.prohabits.com/start>) to boldly and humbly carry forward anti-racism lessons learned. This year's content aligned with MPHA's Strategic Plan and allowed space for individual reflection and future action.

Evaluations showed the majority of respondents either agreed or strongly agreed the conference objectives were met, and over 70% plan to attend next year's conference. Conference objectives were for attendees to:

1. Gain increased understanding of the complexity of public health challenges and identify strategies and action steps for addressing them.
2. Develop new knowledge and skills to address structural racism and health equity to enhance community health in Minnesota.
3. Leave empowered with tools and specific actions to bring back to their organizations to make a meaningful impact.
4. Become emboldened to go on their own anti-racist journey.

The conference was approved for 5.5 CHES / 2.75 MCHES advanced-level credits; CPH and nursing CEUs were also available. 44 people made requests for continuing education credits or certificates of completion.

Programmatically the conference was successful and financially it was also strong. Seventeen donors contributed to the scholarship fund. MPHA was grateful for the generous organizational sponsors supporting the program (see below), and all registrants. Projected conference projected expenses are \$12,000; projected conference income is \$29,700.

Congratulations again to the 2021 Annual Conference Planning Committee, chaired by Elizabeth Moe and Rosemond Sarpong Owens, with support by committee members Delaine Anderson, Dr. Elizabeth Lando-King, Ellen Saliars, Erica Fishman, Kristen Ackert, Kristin Moore, Liz Heimer, Dr. Mfon Archibong, Michelle Clegg, Merry Grande, Sarah Bjorkman, and Summer Robbins, who met over 16 meetings from November – May to plan the 2021 Annual Conference. We look forward to continuing to advance anti-racist public health with MPHA's future programming.

Global Health

The Global Health Committee is currently meeting in tandem with the Health Equity Committee due to co-chair vacancy.

Health Equity

MPHA is acutely aware of the significant and longstanding disparities in health outcomes among African Americans, American Indians and other populations of color in Minnesota and elsewhere. These inequities have continued to be seen in the higher rates of illness and death in American Indian and population of color due to the COVID-19 pandemic. These disparities are an indication of deep systemic inequities that exist to prevent some communities from thriving and achieving optimal health. The opportunity to be healthy should be available everywhere and for everyone in Minnesota, but the data reveals otherwise.

The adoption of a “Racism as a Public Health Crisis” resolution by the membership of MPHA affirms our commitment to health equity and anti-racism work by addressing structural racism. As stated in the resolution “MPHA will recognize the severe impact of racism on the well-being of Minnesotans and actively engage in racial equity to name, reverse and repair the harm done to American Indians and People of Color in Minnesota...”

The Health Equity Committee convenes monthly. Participants learn about equity efforts, share and document promising practices, and partner with the MPHA Policy Committee to review, monitor and support legislative activity related to equity and health. At each meeting there is an educational presentation and time for discussion and taking action. The committee participated in the planning of the 2021 virtual conference, which focused on health equity.

We were pleased to have received an award this year from the American Family Insurance Dreams Foundation for submitting the following statement. “The Minnesota Public Health Association is a volunteer organization at the forefront of supporting the public health workforce during this pandemic and actively addresses racism in Minnesota through education, engagement, and policy development.” This year our members provided education at each of our meetings and supported providing education to members in collaboration at a pre-conference session and the conference. A partnership was established with the Minnesota Department of Health, Health Promotion & Chronic Disease Division to provide health equity speakers and trainings. Statements or resolutions developed included: a letter to Governor Walz asking him to declare racism as a public health crisis; Statements on the Upcoming Criminal Trial of Derek Chauvin and on the Verdict, the death of Daunte Wright, Speaking Out Against Anti-Asian Racism, and the January 6th U.S. Insurrection. We assisted in the drafting of the “Universal School Meals” and “Impact of Climate Change” resolutions approved by membership. Testimony was also provided at the House Select Committee on Racial Justice Healing.

Ongoing efforts include continuing to encourage other organizations to adapt or adopt a statement of acknowledgement of ancestral lands, supporting the implementation of non-partisan voter registration as required by Minnesota State agencies and encouraging other agencies to voluntarily implement this policy.

The Health Equity Committee also worked collaboratively with other MPHA committees and the Governing Council to secure funding from Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Minnesota to advance MPHA’s health racial justice and health equity work. We will continue our work to address structural racism within MPHA and Minnesota as it impacts the public’s health. Melanie Peterson-Hickey, Jaime Martínez and Erica Fishman are the co-chairs. History

Led by chair Donna Anderson, the MPHA History Committee continued its work on promoting the MPHA records collection, housed at the Social Welfare History Archives Library on the University of Minnesota campus. In December 2020 the Social Welfare History Archives received a \$10,000 Legacy Amendment grant from the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund through the Minnesota Historical Society for the digital preservation and access project Public Health in Minnesota: Digitizing Recordings of “A Public Health Journal” TV program. University of Minnesota archivist Linnea Anderson, with inspiration and input from MPHA’s Donna Anderson and Merry Grande, envisioned a 12-month project to digitize over 300 recordings of the “A Public Health Journal” television program and make them available online. The tapes, which are part of the MPHA records in SWHA, document a range of public health topics but are not viewable because they are in obsolete formats.



Digitizing “A Public Health Journal” will make the programs available online, create a timely addition to current debates on public health, and make the history of public health in Minnesota come alive for a diverse audience of community members, scholars, students, and public health and medical professionals.

Leadership

The Leadership committee, co-chaired by Cherylee Sherry and Ann Zukoski, is responsible for identifying future leaders of the organization, developing a slate of candidates for officer elections, providing ongoing support and training to new members and identifying public health leaders to receive annual awards. Congratulations to this year’s award winners, who were honored at the MPHA Annual Business Meeting and Awards Ceremony on June 15, 2021, via Zoom video conference.

Policy and Advocacy

The Policy & Advocacy Committee has continued its work on key public health policy issues this year. Annie Halland and Laura Klein continue to co-lead the committee. The Policy & Advocacy committee

identified MPHA’s policy priorities for 2021. These priorities included supporting efforts to reduce health inequities; policies and programs that ensure access to affordable health care; public health funding, including increasing local public health grant funds and maintaining Statewide Health Improvement Partnership (SHIP) funding; policies that optimize mental health; gun violence prevention efforts; environmental health efforts to ensure healthy families, clean water, clean air, and a healthy climate; and supporting efforts to reduce the impact of COVID-19.

Bringing voices together: The monthly Policy & Advocacy Committee meetings continued to be an avenue for collaboration and information sharing between public health advocates, organizations, and coalitions. The committee continued relationships with several coalitions, including the Minnesotans for Healthy Kids, Minnesotans for a Smoke-Free Generation, and Health Professionals for a Healthy Climate. Members of the committee served as representatives to these coalitions, and they participated by coordinating advocacy efforts and facilitating communication between the coalitions and MPHA.

The Policy & Advocacy Committee also facilitated a well-attended pre-conference session: a discussion with Vayong Moua on anti-racist public health advocacy.

Advocating for key public health issues: MPHA advocated on several issues this past year, including equitable COVID-19 vaccine access, dental coverage expansion, SHIP funding, healthy climate promotion, and increasing CDC and HRSA funding.

MPHA 2021 Legislative Priorities:

- Support efforts to **reduce health inequities** – including, but not limited to, impacts of racism, maternal health disparities, housing instability
- Support policies and programs that ensure **access to affordable health care**
- Support **public health funding**– including maintaining Statewide Health Improvement Partnership (SHIP) funding and increasing local public health grant funds
- Support policies that promote optimal **mental health**, including interconnected issues such as substance use and suicide
- Support **gun violence prevention** efforts
- Support **environmental health & justice** efforts to ensure healthy families, clean water, clean air, and a healthy climate
- Support efforts to reduce impact of **COVID-19** in Minnesota

Resolutions: This year the committee drafted one new resolution on the Impact of Climate Change on Health. The resolution was passed during the MPHA Annual Business Meeting held in June 2021.

Organizational Activities and Events

Development Task Force

The MPHA Development Task force works on seeking grant, sponsorship, and donor gifts to defray membership and event costs for attendees, provide scholarships to keep MPHA programming accessible to all who wish to engage, fund special campaigns and provide general organizational support. This group helped obtain sponsoring organizations for our Policy Forums and Annual Conference, received online and mailed general donations, and sent an end of year appeal letter to supporters. MPHA also participated in GiveMN’s popular “Give to the Max Day” in November.

Sponsoring organizations supported MPHA with a total of \$19,250 in funding. During this tremendous year of the Covid-19 pandemic and virtual programming, MPHA was grateful for a total of 95 individual donations, totaling \$8,195 during the time period of July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021. These gifts supported MPHA's general operating expenses, membership, annual conference scholarships and the Policy Forums, and the History Preservation and Access Fund. This group is led by Merry Grande.

Policy Forums

The 2020-2021 Public Health Matters Policy Forum series explored the intersection between **environmental health and health equity, titled “Environmental Health: Is There Justice for All?”**. The MPHA forums are intended to explore the challenges we face in ensuring that the public health needs of every Minnesotan are addressed. We hosted four *virtual* forums this year. We were proud to have hosted a lively virtual audience and also to livestream the events over Facebook Live.



December 4, 2020...in the water we use

This forum's panelists and participants addressed the distribution of Minnesota's water resources. Is there equal access to clean water? Where is the greatest impact of water pollution felt?

January 15, 2021...in the places we live

Making sure that there is a fair distribution of the environmental resources needed for good health takes planning. Our panelists considered environmental health topics related to waste treatment and landfill properties, road and bicycle routes, and green space. Do we have equitable distribution of these resources?

March 5, 2021...for our vulnerable populations

Our panelists, moderator and participants explored the distribution and impact of environmental health burdens and resources for our most vulnerable population groups. In what ways do environmental concerns influence social determinants of health?

May 7, 2021...in our public health response

The final forum of the series examined the public health response to environmental health. We will ponder together the question, “What can we do better?”

All past forums are archived on MPHA's Facebook page. Attendance consisted of both members and nonmembers, ranging from 45-65 attendees per forum, with many more accessing the recordings after the events. Focused outreach was done to encourage students and early professionals to attend and for members from outside the Twin Cities to engage in the virtual events.

Past Presidents Group

Membership in this group is automatically given to all past presidents with the purpose of continually engaging the wisdom and experience of the group in service to MPHA. Members of this group have a voting seat on the Governing Council, encourage membership on MPHA committees, mentor and coach Governing Council members and committee chairs. Unfortunately, the Past Presidents Group did not

have an opportunity to meet in person this year. However virtual connections were facilitated by Past President Liaison Nancy Franke Wilson and the Executive Director. The group began coordinating remembrances and a memorial collection to honor the lifetime of public health and medical work of Dr. Harold (Hal) Leppink, MPHA's President in 1976.

American Public Health Association

Each year the MPHA President and the Affiliate Representative to the Governing Council (ARGC) of the APHA attend the association's annual meeting. This year was not like any other year in that APHA was held virtually! Prior to the opening session, Erica Fishman, the ARGC, attended the Great Lakes Public Health Coalition (GLPHC) meeting where she became the incoming chair. Erica also attended the APHA Governing Council meetings, the APHA policy statement hearings, the candidate's forum and as well as other APHA business meetings and scientific sessions. Erica presented as part of a panel session "Affiliate best practices to advance health equity" where she shared MPHA's recent efforts. While in-person discussions were missed, "break-out" rooms provided the opportunity for small-group conversations. A video of Ellen Saliaries welcoming people to APHA from MPHA (filmed in northern MN) was shown during one of APHA's main sessions. Erica Fishman and Merry Grande coordinated our annual "luncheon" gathering for MPHA members attending the meeting. The virtual event provided a time to reconnect with colleagues as well as make new friends who are passionate about public health.

Another APHA opportunity is for every Affiliate President-Elect to attend a two-day meeting where they learn more about APHA and network with others in similar roles. This year's virtual meeting was in July over two days.

Great Lakes Public Health Coalition

MPHA is part of The Great Lakes Public Health Coalition (GLPHC) - the group of Region V state affiliates of APHA. These six state public health associations (Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin) came together in 1983 for the purpose of mutual support and shared learning. Over the years, the GLPHC has been recognized by APHA as a model for other states. The Coalition meets in-person at a mid-year meeting and at the APHA conference and holds monthly conference calls. The GLPHC continued its focus on health equity. Erica Fishman, as Minnesota's ARGC is our representative on the GLPHC and holds the position of chair. This year's mid-year meeting was held virtually! We began with a presentation by Human Impact Partners on "Racial Justice and Power-building: A Health Equity Framework". MPHA's Health Equity Committee co-chairs and the President-Elect also participated. The GLPHC also presented a plenary at the MPHA Annual Conference title: How the Great Lakes Public Health Coalition works to address racial equity in the Region V APHA Affiliates <https://sites.google.com/view/mpha2021/regionvaffiliate>. The rest of the meeting time was devoted to updating the strategic plan, self-education, and sharing of Affiliate best practices. Erica is also the representative of Region V to the Council of Affiliates (CoA). This committee meets monthly and is the liaison between the Affiliates and APHA.
